
GENTIANACEAE

Gentian family

Centaurium erythraea Rafn

Status & distribution: Native, Least Concern (Red List for England); locally common in the lowland districts.

Habitat: Sand-dunes, grasslands and open ground on clay soils, limestone quarries, on alkaline waste beds and industrial spoil heaps.


Comments: Several varieties have been recognised.

Centaurium erythraea var. latifolium (Sm.) T.C.G. Rich Broad-leaved Centaury Status & distribution: Native, Endemic, Extinct; The Rabbit Warren, Crosby (SJ39E, J Shepherd, 1801, LIV; J Shillito 1818, LIV); Bootle (SJ39H, TB Hall, 1832 Herb. Bowman); North Shore, Liverpool (SJ39, A Bloxam, 1843, MANCH); on Seaforth Common near Rimrose Bridge (SJ39I, HS Fisher, 1854-1855, MANCH); Ainsdale, near Southport (SD31B, JB Wood, 1860, MANCH); Formby Sandhills (SD20Z, R Brown, 1871, LIV); near Freshfield Station (SD20Z, R Brown, 1871-1872).

Habitat: Moist ground and grassy spots in sand-dune systems near the sea.

Comments: It is known that the Bootle and Seaforth plants were lost to dock extensions and building, other population no doubt suffered due to over-zealous collecting. R Brown apparently collected the last two specimens from near Freshfield Station (SD20Z, 1871).

Centaurium x intermedium (Wheldon)
Druce = C. erythraea x C. littorale

Status & distribution: Native,

Axiophyte; locally frequent along the coast from Seaforth to Birkdale; recently found at Marshside (SD31P).

Habitat: Dune-slacks, damp coastal sand often in brackish conditions.


Comments: The earliest record traced is from Hightown (SD20W, WG Travis, 1913) but there may be earlier records for the vice-county during the early 19th Century *Smith's Eng. Fl. ed.* 2 (1828).

Centaurium x ubsdellii T.C.G. Rich = C. pulchellum x C. erythraea

Status & distribution: Native, Critically Endangered or Extinct at the vice-county level; Altcar (SD30C, V Gordon, 1998).


Habitat: Dune-slack.

Centaurium littorale (Turner ex Sm.) Gilmour Seaside Centaur



Birkdale Green Beach PH Smith 2012 **Status & distribution:** Native, Nationally Scarce, Least Concern (Red List for England), Axiophyte; Occasional along the coast from Seaforth northwards; locally abundant on the Birkdale Green Beach (SD31C) with *C. pulchellum*; formerly extending north to Churchtown. **Habitat:** Dune-slacks, damp coastal sand often in brackish conditions.


Centaurium pulchellum (Sw.) Druce



Birkdale Green Beach J Somerville 2008 **Status & distribution:** Native, Least Concern (Red List for England), Axiophyte; mainly coastal, locally abundant along the Green Beaches at Southport, rare inland.

Habitat: Dune-slacks, wet coastal sand, developing saltmarshes and pond margins. **Comments:** Populations are known to have fluctuated from locally common to declining and rare.

Blackstonia perfoliata (L.) Huds.






Warrington J Somerville 2008

Status & distribution: Native, Least
Concern (Red List for England),
Axiophyte; frequent along the coast, about
Speke and on the former industrial sites
from St. Helens to Manchester.

Habitat: Sand-dunes, clay banks,
grasslands on disturbed clay soils adjacent
to motorways and trunk roads, colonist of
industrial spoil heaps and waste ground.

Comments: Greatly increased inland
since the times of the Victorian Liverpool,
Manchester and Preston floras and of
Savidge et al (1963).

Gentianella campestris (L.) Boerner Field Gentian







Status & distribution: Native, Endangered (Red List for England), Rare (3); Freshfield (SD20Z) & Ainsdale (SD21V & SD21W) with thousands of plants occurring in the slacks of the Dune Restoration Area at Ainsdale NNR. There are un-localised records for SD82 & SD83.

Former distribution: Along the coast from Speke to Southport; occasional in the hill districts.

Habitat: Sand-dunes and formerly in hill pastures.

Comments: Greatly declined and probably extinct in the hill districts.






Knob End R Snowden 2012 **Status & distribution:** Native, Near Threatened (Red List for England), Axiophyte; most frequent along the coast, very local elsewhere.

Habitat: Sand-dunes and limestone pastures; a colonist of alkaline spoil heaps, limestone quarries and the 'hushings'. **Comments:** Declined greatly in the hill districts.

[Gentiana asclepiadea L. Willow Gentian Status & distribution: Neophyte; Holden Clough (SD90F, Anon., 1964, Manuscript records of alien species compiled by E.J. Clement).

Comments: Native to central Europe. This may be an error for a location of the same name in vice-county 64 where numerous exotic species were introduced to the clough from the adjoining garden centre.]

Gentiana pneumonanthe L.





M Knowles 2008 **Status & distribution:** Native, Nationally Scarce.

Near Threatened (Red List for England), Critically Endangered at the vice-county level (1); still present in small and fluctuating numbers at Highfield Moss (SJ69C).

Former distribution: Formerly a local species of the lowlands mosslands especially to the east of Formby. **Habitat:** Amongst *Molinia* on a wet

lowland bog.
